

December 2018 From the Principal's Desk

Dear Parents,

What a crazy week of weather here in Central Illinois! In my six years here in Morton, I don't recall us taking any true "SNOW" days. We have been out for frigid cold temperatures, but not for snow. And in one week, a blizzard warning AND a tornado warning!! Hopefully you and your family did not experience any issues with our severe weather on Saturday. No matter the type of weather, a look at the calendar tells us that it's definitely December! As usual for this time of year, the next three weeks will fly by! I encourage you to keep up with our school and classroom activities by watching the Lincoln School Facebook Page (please like our page!) and school website, by paying close attention to newsletters and notes that come home from your child's teacher and by keeping an eye out for reminder email blasts over the next three weeks. As a reminder, school is dismissed at 11:55 am on Friday, December 21" for Christmas break and resumes on Tuesday, January 8, 2019.

Please note that our upcoming K-1* grade and 2nd-3rd grade
Christmas programs will again take place at Bertha Frank Performing Arts
Center at Morton High School. Please look for specific information from
Mr. Rocke about performance needs. In general, each evening's first
performance begins at 6:30 pm and the second performance at 7:30 pm.
We ask that if your child is a part of the 1* or 3rd grade programs that you
arrive no earlier than 7:00 pm so that the audience from the previous
performance can easily exit the theater before the next audience enters.
Dates and times are listed in later in this newsletter.

I also wanted to bring your attention to information in the newsletter about one of our Lincoln families, the Babins. Jason Babin, parent of Caleb (4th) and Carly (3th) has just finished treatment for Stage 4 Burkitt's Lymphoma. However, he is still unable to work. His brother-inlaw has organized a fundraiser in which he will run from Dunlap to Morton (26.2 miles) on Sunday, December 16th. He will arrive at Lincoln around 11:30 am and we are hoping to have a big crowd to welcome him

after his run and support the Babins. There will be a bake sale here at that time; Kona Ice will be here as well, with all funds raised going to the Babin family. Please read the article in this month's newsletter to learn how you might be able to help the Babin family.

We have so much to celebrate and be thankful for this Christmastime, but we know there are those in our community who need to be remembered and supported. Many families find themselves in great need this holiday season. WINTER WEATHER IS ON THE WAY




The unexpected snow and "blizzard" in November reminded us that now we will need to start thinking about dressing for winter weather and playing outside in the cold during recess.

The students go outside for recess when the temperature (factoring in windchill) is above ten degree Fahrenheit. It's important, even in colder weather, for our students to get outside, exert some energy and get some fresh air.

Recess is about 20 minutes long (a little less by the time the students get their cold weather gear on!), and we try to get our students outside as much as the weather allows. We do allow students to play in the snow on occasion; students will need to have snow pants and snow boots (not fashion boots) to play in the snow, along with mittens/gloves and a coat. Students should bring a different pair of shoes

to wear during the day (and for PE)
and change into their boots for recess.
It is important that children are
appropriately dressed for outside play;
please make sure that your child has
cold weather clothing-coats (with
zippers that work), hats,
gloves/mittens, scarves, snow boots,
snow pants-so that they can play
outside on cold weather days and stay
warm while they are outside! We
appreciate your help!

Lincoln Students Help to Set Cup Stacking Record in PE

If you recall, our Lincoln students participated with other students across the nation as part of the World Sport Stacking Association attempt to break a world record on November 8th during PE classes! The goal was to help set a Guinness World Records mark in sport stacking with having the most people sport stacking at multiple locations in one day. Well...we did it! Lincoln Lions helped to set the record with 624,390 people stacking in multiple locations in one day! In all, 2,833 schools and organizations from 25 different countries helped to set the record. The previous record was 622,809 people stacking together in one day. Thank you to Mr. Becker, Miss DeBoer and Miss Schmitt for allowing our students to participate in this fun activity!



Notes from Nurse Annette

With our cold and flu season upon us, it is good to review some healthy habits for our Morton students!

If your child has vomited, has a fever of over 100' or has an illness that you feel may be serious or contagious, please keep him/her home until fever or illness free for 24 hours. This includes coughing, diarrhea and sore throats. If your child has been diagnosed with strep throat or conjunctivitis (pink eye), s/he needs to be on the prescribed antibiotic medication for a full 24 hours before returning to school.

Remember that teaching your child good hand hygiene is the BEST way to prevent the spread of germs! It is also not too late to get flu shots, too! This will help with the strains of influenza that the CDC feel will be most prominent this flu season.

Lice continues to be an issue in all schools. It is a very common problem, especially for kids. Lice are contagious, annoying and sometimes tough to get rid of. While they are frustrating to deal with, lice aren't dangerous. They don't spread disease, although their bites can make a child's scalp itchy and irritated and scratching can lead to infection. It's best to treat head lice

quickly once they are found because they can spread easily from person to person. If a child is found to be with lice at school, s/he does not need to be sent home from school immediately (though a parent will be contacted and may choose to pick up a student in order to begin treatment). A child may return to school after the administration of a proper lice treatment. If a child is found to be with lice at home, we ask that parents please let us know so that we can treat the classroom areas (carpet, reading pillows, etc.) as well. Morton 709 policy is that we will notify parents of a child found to be with lice; other students' parents will not be contacted. We encourage you to make lice checks a regular part of home hygiene as you care for your children. A good reference for information and tips regarding care for your child's health is kidshealth.org. I am also glad to be an additional resource to assist our families in the Morton 709 school district. Have a healthy winter!





LINCOLN LITERACY!



Does your child hate to read? Do they only read what is required? This month's tips can help you with resistant and frustrated readers!



If your child has a difficult relationship with books, start small!

★IF THEY ARE A FRUSTRATED READER:

Confidence is key! Rereading familiar books, or easier reads, and praising your child's success is going to help build their confidence and start to change their perception of themselves as a reader. (Easier texts are also **GREAT** for fluency!) Communicate with their teacher about the positives he/she is seeing in the classroom as well as the goals they have for your child, and reinforce these at home! If <u>you're</u> frustrated, <u>they're</u> frustrated, so take a deep breath and take a break if a book becomes too challenging.

★IF THEY JUST DON'T LIKE READING:

They haven't found the right book yet! There are books about **everything**! Search online, your local library (the Morton librarians are FANTASTIC!), or even your child's teacher--they know all the BEST books! Getting your child hooked on a topic, genre, or series can be the kickstart to a love of reading! Encourage reading for pleasure not just assignment. Getting time to read should be a gift, not a punishment.

★ IF THEY'VE FALLEN OUT OF LOVE WITH READING:

Go back to where it all started. Create that comfy space, open up your child's favorite book, and READ TO THEM! Your child is **never** too old to be read to, and hearing you read helps them hear what good readers sound like! Show excitement about looking forward to reading the next chapter and connect positive experiences with the act of reading.
