COLD WEATHER RECESS DRESS REMINDERS



While the weather may be getting colder as winter approaches, it is important for our students to continue to have outdoor recess whenever possible. Typically, students will go outside when the temperature or wind chill is 10 degrees or higher. Recess is about 20 minutes long (a little less by the time the students get coats, hats, gloves/mittens, scarves, boots, etc. on!), so we try to get our students outside as much as the weather allows. There will be times when it's simply too cold or windy to go outside. We do allow students to play in the snow on occasion; students will need to have snow pants and snow boots on to play in the snow. It is important that children are appropriately dressed for outside play; please make sure that your child has cold weather clothing-coats (with

zippers that work), hats, gloves/mittens, scarves, snow boots, snow pants-so that they can play outside on cold weather days and stay warm while they are outside! We appreciate your help!!

Gameball Run in the Early
Planning Stages

We are already beginning to plan for this year's Gameball Run, our district's philanthropic efforts for the Children's Hospital of Illinois, located at OSF-St. Francis in Peoria. Each year, our community comes together to raise funds for the CHOI. These activities include business and personal sponsorships, a 60 minute run at MHS and a wide variety of fundraising activities at all Morton 709 schools in January and February.

Each school identifies a "Miracle Family" and that family's story is highlighted as part of the Gameball Run events. These families have utilized the services of CHOI and want to give back by sharing their family's story. Lincoln School's Miracle Family is the Getz Family-parents John and Christy, along with their daughter Maggie, who is in 5th grade at Lincoln. As an infant, Maggie needed medical care provided at the CHOI.

We'll learn more about the Getz's family story and find out more about Lincoln's Gameball Run efforts in the months ahead. Our school's Gameball Run Kick Off Assembly will be Friday, January 17th. For now, mark Friday, February 21st as the Gameball Run boys' basketball game at MHS; the run will be Thursday, February 20th at 4 pm at MHS. In addition, Friday, January 31st will be Lincoln School Night at the MHS Boys' basketball game. The Getz family will be the guests of the team and will be

introduced at the end of the first quarter.



Notes from Nurse Annette

With our cold and flu season upon us, it is good to review some healthy habits for our Morton students!

If your child has vomited, has a fever of over 100' or has an illness that you feel may be serious or contagious, please keep him/her home until fever or illness free for 24 hours. This includes coughing, diarrhea and sore throats. If your child has been diagnosed with strep throat or conjunctivitis (pink eye), s/he needs to be on the prescribed antibiotic medication for a full 24 hours before returning to school.

Remember that teaching your child good hand hygiene is the BEST way to prevent the spread of germs! It is also not too late to get flu shots, too! This will help with the strains of influenza that the CDC feel will be most prominent this flu season.

Lice is a very common problem, especially for kids. Lice are contagious, annoying and sometimes tough to get rid of. While they are frustrating to deal with, lice aren't dangerous. They don't spread disease, although their bites can make a child's scalp

itchy and irritated and scratching can lead to infection. It's best to treat head lice quickly once they are found because they can spread easily from person to person. If a child is found to be with lice at school, s/he does not need to be sent home from school immediately (though a parent will be contacted and may choose to pick up a student in order to begin treatment). A child may return to school after the administration of a proper lice treatment. If a child is found to be with lice at home, we ask that parents please let us know so that we can treat the classroom areas (carpet, reading pillows, etc.) as well. Morton 709 policy is that we will notify parents of a child found to be with lice; other students' parents will not be contacted. We encourage you to make lice checks a regular part of home hygiene as you care for your children. A good reference for information and tips


Conversations With Your Child

Strategy of the Month ~ QUESTIONING


■ Readers ask questions about the text and the author's intentions to
 ■ seek information, clarify, and extend their thinking before, during
 ■ and after reading.

Simply asking your child to tell you about what they read may be too
 ■ general. A few questioning strategies many help improve the
 ■ conversation.

- "Right There" questions are on a literal level and have answers that can be found in a specific place in the text.
- "Think and Search" questions are on an inferential level and have answers that relate to information found in the text.
- "Author and Me" questions have answers that are not stated in the text. It requires the students to combine previous knowledge with evidence from the text.

These levels of questions are on an increasing level of difficulty, and it requires practice to develop these critical thinking skills.

For example, a "Right There" (Thin) question could have the young readers naming the major characters and locations in a story. They could sequence the events in the story and tell you how characters react to the events.



In "Think and Search" (Thick) questions, the student could explain character traits and personalities. They could justify, from the character's point of view, why they reacted the way they did to the events in the story.

In "Author and Me" questions, the students could analyze a character's traits and personalities. They could compare how a character's actions are alike and different from a similar character in another story.

Good reading comprehension is critical to school success and involves so much more than just rote memorization of information. Students will be excited to have conversation before, during and after reading!

Reading Challenge of the Month



Reading every day increases accuracy, fluency, stamina and comprehension. Comprehension is also greatly increased by active questioning before, during and after reading. *Challenge* yourself to answer at least one (before) one (during) and one (after) question when you are reading. You will be amazed at how much more you will understand and remember what you have read!

Hello Lincoln Lions!

With first quarter officially behind us, our first snowfall of the season, and the addition of Christmas songs on the radio, we are reminded that the holiday season is upon us! Although it is an exciting time of year, it can also be a rather stressful time for those who have family visiting from out of town or for students who were disappointed by their academic progress throughout their first quarter of school. Before getting too overwhelmed by the upcoming festivities, I encourage each one of you to press pause and recognize the stressors that you or your child are currently experiencing as the first Wednesday of November marks National Stress Awareness Day. As adults, it is easy to forget the social dynamics and academic pressure that children face on a day to day basis. Although a moderate amount of stress allows us to take on new challenges, an excessive amount over an extended period of time can lead to feelings of anxiety, avoidance of hard tasks, and/or withdraw from social opportunities. As a caregiver, it is important to tune into your child's behavior in order to determine whether he or she is experiencing a high level of stress at home or at school, as young children may not be able to accurately name how they feel. Common signs of excessive stress include; crying, sleeping too much or too little, changes in appetite, irritable mood, complaining about school and/or classmates, or complaining of stomachaches, headaches, or other physical pains.

If you notice any of these changes, there are a variety of things that you can do to help you child. First, look for a calm time to talk to your child about the signs that you have noticed. If school work is causing your child to experience a great deal of stress, attempt to establish a regular after-school routine including; down time, a quiet and neat study area, a discussion about what tasks need to be accomplished, a set amount of time that should be spent on homework each night, and an opportunity for you and your child to sit down and review his/her work. Also, for those who tend to hyper focus on grades, encourage your child to look at his/her grades online a limited amount throughout the quarter. In addition to tackling school work with your child, it is also critical to teach the importance of balance through play, involvement in extracurricular activities, family dinners, and exercise! Last but not least, sleep is crucial to dealing with the ups and downs that we all face. School age children should sleep between 9 to 12 hours per night. Some tips to helping your child get a restful night's sleep include; limiting screen time at least 1 hour before bedtime, using the bed for sleep only, taking a warm bath or shower at night, engaging in deep breathing exercises, and/or listening to white noise or calm music.

Along with these suggestions, it is also beneficial for children (and adults!) to journal two to three things per day that they are grateful for. This allows us all to focus on the positive aspects of our lives that we often forget to notice in the day to day shuffle!

I hope you all have a fantastic, relaxing start to the holiday season!
