Dear Lincoln Families,

Welcome to the month of October! After a cautious (and sometimes nervous) start to the school year, we are settling into the year. Incredibly, we are winding down the first quarter of the school year with no interruptions to our in-person learning commitment. That's cause for celebration!! We continue to be grateful to our students, parents and families who faithfully follow our expectations for school attendance. Our students have handled the mask wearing like pros! They understand the importance of our hand washing and sanitizing procedures, and have accepted the changes in our lunch time procedures without complaint. 

DRESS CODE REMINDERS

School Lunch Options

In September, our food service provider, Arbor Management Inc., made some changes to our daily hot lunch options. First of all, school lunches are now free for all students who want to order hot lunch. There are always two choices offered per day, along with a vegetable, a fruit and the choice of white or chocolate milk. This will continue through December 2020.

The second change is that students who bring a cold lunch may choose to supplement their cold lunch with the "Pick 4 Free" offer. Students can add a fruit, vegetable, grain and milk for FREE to their cold lunch. Students must pick at least 3 items to count as a free lunch. We will begin offering this as Choice 3 when students make their lunch choice each morning so that our food service personnel can

appropriately plan for the correct number of meals.
This will also continue through December 2020.

Since we have returned to school, we know many parents have missed coming to school for lunch with their children. For now, we need to maintain our current practices with no visitors at lunch time. However, some parents have asked to pick up their child and take him/her out for lunch, which is a great option. We look forward to the day when we can resume some of our usual traditions, with lunch at school with your child being one of them!



ARTISTIC ADVENTURES UPDATE

Because of several limitations, we have not been able to get started with Artistic Adventures this school year. Artistic Adventures is a PTO initiative that brings hands on art projects and activities to our students in the classroom. Our coordinators organize parent volunteers who present the lessons to the students each month. There is a specific curriculum of lessons that our parent volunteers teach to our students.

Unfortunately, we are not able to start
Artistic Adventures at this time. Our
program is successful because we have
several parent volunteers who teach the
lesson, assist with the distribution of
materials, assist with set up, clean up, etc.
Even if we were to only have one parent
volunteer or present a recorded lesson that

materials among students unless there is a
"quarantine time" between use.

In October, we will be focusing specifically on demonstrating empathy towards others. In our Monthly Morning Virtual Assembly which will be presented to students this week, we shared about all of the different ways that we can show empathy towards one another.

News from Mrs. Molly Winker. School Social Worker

October is National Anti-Bullying Month. In recent years a spotlight has been placed on the issue of bullying, however, there is often confusion about what type of behavior should receive consequences linked to a school's anti-bullying policy. In order for schools to properly intervene when necessary, it is important to know the basic difference between "mean" behavior and "bullying". Behavior that is "mean" is often an intentional attempt to make someone feel less than or bad about who they are in an effort to boost one's confidence and/or status. Examples include; "your shirt is ugly", "I would never be friends with you!", "You are so lame". While comments such as these are extremely hurtful and unacceptable, they can often be addressed rather quickly. Bullying on the other hand includes actions that are physically, relationally, and verbally aggressive. Bullying also includes an intent to harm someone, unequal power, and repetition of the same or similar acts over time. Bullying includes the following examples:

Physical Aggression: kicking, hitting, tripping, spitting, hair pulling, and pushing.
Verbal Aggression: Threatening to harm another person or verbal put downs that are repeated over time.

Relationship aggression: Shunning, spreading rumors, and social exclusion. Cyberbullying: name-calling, spreading of rumors, impersonating another person, posting pictures without consent via text message, email, and other social media sites.

Bullying has the potential to impact a student's academic performance, self-esteem, relationships with others, interest in school and other extracurricular activities. In an effort to prevent bullying from occurring here at Lincoln, we will be discussing the meaning and importance of empathy and how it can be used as a tool to support others who are experiencing a tough time.

As we approach the second quarter of the school year (which is very hard to believe!). our staff will begin focusing on addressing aspects of each student's social emotional health through the completion of the BASC-3 BESS. The BESS is a short survey that will be completed each year in the fall, winter, and spring by teachers in an effort to identify students who may benefit from Response to Intervention (RTI) support in the area of social emotional learning (SEL). SEL is the process through which children acquire the knowledge, attitudes, and skills they need to recognize and manage their emotions, demonstrate care and concern for others, establish positive relationships, make responsible decisions, and handle challenging situations constructively. As a district, our hope is to provide students with the tools they need to grow their self-confidence and unlock their academic potential. For those who are identified through the SEL screening process at the end of this month, there are four RTI services that are available:

Check In/Check Out: An intervention that is used to help students develop a relationship with a staff member in an effort to decrease

behaviors (i.e. Blurting out, Focus). CI/CO includes increased prompts for appropriate behavior, increased adult feedback, increased daily structure, and increased feedback to families about their child's behavior.

Skill-building Group: Small groups of students that meet weekly with student support personnel (social worker, psychologist) to target specific skills such as: self-awareness, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision making.

Peer Mentoring: Opportunities to learn and engage with peers, such as specific group meetings where students learn and support one another in relation to a specific skill (i.e. a friendship group).

Individualized Classroom Supports: Various classroom supports to help enhance social awareness such as flexible seating, visual boundaries, break cards, social stories, fidgets, and personal space.

Strategy of the Month ~ QUESTIONING


Readers ask questions about the text and the author's intentions to
 seek information, clarify, and extend their thinking before, during
 and after reading.

Simply asking your child to tell you about what they read may be too
 general. A few questioning strategies many help improve the
 conversation.

- "Right There" questions are on a literal level and have answers that can be found in a specific place in the text.
- "Think and Search" questions are on an inferential level and have answers that relate to information found in the text.
- "Author and Me" questions have answers that are not stated in the text. It requires the students to combine previous knowledge with evidence from the text.

These levels of questions are on an increasing level of difficulty, and it requires practice to develop these critical thinking skills.

For example, a "Right There" (Thin) question could have the young readers naming the major characters and locations in a story. They could sequence the events in the story and tell you how characters react to the events.



In "Think and Search" (Thick) questions, the student could explain character traits and personalities. They could justify, from the character's point of view, why they reacted the way they did to the events in the story.

In "Author and Me" questions, the students could analyze a character's traits and personalities. They could compare how a character's actions are alike and different from a similar character in another story.

Good reading comprehension is critical to school success and involves so much more than just rote memorization of information. Students will be excited to have conversations before, during and after reading!

Reading Challenge of the Month

October is the month where we celebrate the beginning of fall! Here are some ways to challenge yourself to read this month:

- read books about the season or that take place during fall
- find books about apple or pumpkin picking
- read a spooky story about qhosts or qoblins
- put on your Halloween costume and read one of your favorite books under the covers with a flashlight






