Kindergarten students 'thriving'

Teachers report positive impact of all-day kindergarten at all elementary schools

A ll-day kindergarten is in full swing and with the school year half-way completed, the Morton School District would like to update the community on how the implementation is progressing.

Even though all day kindergarten is not a new addition to Jefferson School, it has increased the professional development opportunities for their teachers. "Although all-day kindergarten did not change much for my students at Jefferson, it has impacted me as a teacher in that planning with colleagues from other schools is much more possible because we all have similar schedules and opportunities now," said Jefferson School Kindergarten Teacher Mrs. Allison Bonhoff.

Thus far, the kindergarten teachers are pleased with the implementation of full-day kindergarten. They are able to cover more subjects, focus on more social developmental skills, and the students have more time to be engaged with their teacher and peers.

Mrs. Jodi Hoelscher has taught both full-day and half-day kindergarten at Lincoln Elementary School and shared her thoughts on the transition: "It is truly amazing! The students are thriving and are absolutely loving school! As a teacher, I feel like I know my students and their needs

on a much higher level than I did in the past."

Students had adjustments to make in the beginning of the school year, but these were to be expected for kindergarten students. Mrs. Hoelscher added, "As in any grade, the first month of school is challenging. The students were building stamina to be in school all day, learning expectations of not only the classroom, but lunch

and recess as well. The students adjusted to the lunch routine rather quickly and P.E. is one of their favorite parts of the day. They love having that time to be active and play games and exercise with their peers."

The kindergarten teachers have reported that they are able to cover more subjects and have more activities with their students than in previous years. "Being able to

teach language every day has been so beneficial to the students," said Mrs. Hoelscher. "We are able to focus on phonics and engage them in so many different texts. We are also able to expose the students to more STEM activities."

Students are much more relaxed as they have more time to work on their subjects. "I honestly feel their stress level has decreased," said Mrs.

Hoelscher. "We are able to teach at a much more age-appropriate pace, allowing students the time they need for discovery and repeated practice, rather than trying to cram a large amount of information into a small amount of time."

Likewise, student performance has increased in comparison to the metrics recorded last year. "After completing the reading benchmark assessments for winter, many students are above the benchmark for this point in the year, which is great news," said Mrs. Hoelscher. "I have also seen great improvement in the students' overall social skills and peer interactions. During purposeful play, they are able to work through their differences with a teacher to model appropriate problem-solving strategies."

In addition, Mrs. Jeanette Grant, Grundy Elementary kindergarten teacher, indicated, "I also was able to compare the data of the students from this year and those in the past. Their reading levels are at least one or two levels above where they've been in the past at this time of the year and we are three units beyond where we typically are in reading and math."

Lastly, the kindergarten teachers are very thankful to have full-day kindergarten for their students. Mrs. Bonhoff expressed her gratitude and excitement for the community, teachers, and students.

"I'm just so thankful that all of the students in our district now get the benefit of all-day kindergarten. As a teacher at Jefferson, I've been blessed to see such growth in my students over the course of a year across subject areas because we have time to devote daily to reading, math, writing, science, social studies, and play," she said.

"It's just such a blessing for teachers, students, and families alike and I'm excited to see how it impacts our district as these students pass through later grades."

oach Jesse Crawford is the head baseball coach at both Morton Junior High and Morton High School. As many already know, the MHS boys' baseball team brought home some very nice hardware as the 2018 Class 3A Baseball State Champions.


On Jan. 26, Coach Crawford will be receiving another honor - the Class 3A Coach of the Year award presented by the Illinois High School Baseball Coaches Association.


Prior to serving as a teacher and coach in Morton, Crawford was an assistant coach promoted to head coach at Knox County High School in Missouri. There, Coach Crawford coached both the varsity basketball and baseball programs and was named Class 2A Coach of the Year for both sports. He also led his basketball team to two Sweet 16 appearances with a 68-42 overall record.

As an assistant basketball coach at MHS, he helped the Potters program advance to its first Elite Eight in program history. A few years later, Crawford took over as Head Varsity Baseball Coach and Head Junior High Baseball Coach.

As the head coach at MJHS, the Junior Potters completed an undefeated 25-0 season and won the IESA State Championship. In his six years heading the Junior Potter program, Crawford's record is 124-31 with two title game appearances and two additional Elite Eight bids.

As a varsity baseball coach at Knox County and Morton, Jesse Crawford holds a 189-110 record. He has been part of 11 conference titles in 14 years of coaching. Over the past four seasons, his varsity team at Morton High School has averaged 28 wins per season and

made an Elite Eight appearance in 2017 backed up by a State Title in 2018. The Potters have also captured multiple Mid-Illini Conference, Regional and Sectional crowns during Crawford's tenure.

Coach Crawford's persistence and coaching style has made an impact on his assistant coach and the baseball program. MHS and MJHS Baseball Assistant Coach Steve Bates commented, "I'm the only assistant coach that is fortunate to assist Coach Crawford with High School and Jr High baseball teams as well as getting the opportunity to assist him with all of his baseball camps during the year for Morton boys ages 8-13."

"Coach Crawford is the Morton Baseball Program. I say that because Coach Crawford provides coaching and counseling to Morton baseball players at all levels. I get the opportunity to watch how he works with baseball players and how he monitors their progress starting at approximately 8 years old. He never gives up on any boy that continues to try and improve their baseball abilities. He always sees something good in any player that goes out and gives baseball 100 percent."

Potters baseball alum Anthony Mannino expresses his gratitude for what Coach Crawford has brought to the program, "The Potter Baseball alumni are very proud of Coach Crawford. This award is well deserved."

"Not just for the wins and the trophy but for developing young athletes on and off the white lines. Instilling his same passion into the players and keeping them accountable for their hard work," he added. "With the team chemistry he develops, there will be a Baseball Dynasty in Morton (south of Chicago) for a long time."

Sign up for kindergarten pre-registration

Planning for the first day of school this fall is well underway. Signup for Kindergarten preregistration and screening will begin in February.

On March 21 and 22, Morton School District 709 will conduct the preregistration and screening at the District Office, 1050 S. Fourth Ave., for students who will be 5 years old by Sept. 1.

"The screening helps schools plan for the number of kindergarten classes needed and to get some baseline data on our new students," said Michael Saunders, principal at Grundy Elementary. "It helps us to get to know each child as a learner."

The screening process takes about 30 minutes and is conducted by kindergarten teachers. The screening includes letter, number and color identification, counting, shapes, and fine motor skills. Following the screening, parents will receive feedback from the teacher.

"It gives parents a clear picture of their child at that point," Mr. Saunders said. "The teacher will let the parent know what they can be working on before school starts."

All students will need to be screened prior to the first day of school. To schedule an appointment, call 263-2581.

Mentor program helps students & community

everal local companies have set out to make a difference in the educational careers of the Morton High School students. It is all a part of the Morton Mentor Program designed by the Morton Chamber of Commerce and Morton District 709 to provide work-based learning experiences for students and promote living and working in our community.

The mentoring program began as a community project out of the Morton Chamber of Commerce's leadership program.

The Morton Mentor Program launched three years ago with the idea to connect Morton High School students and local professionals in a one-to-one mentoring relationship to help students gain an in-depth understanding of a chosen career pathway.

The program seeks to help students narrow down their potential career options while providing them an opportunity to network and practice soft skills.

"The vision of the program is to see students become more confident in their decision to pursue or not pursue a certain career," said Lenora Fisher, Community Development Director at the Morton Chamber of Commerce.

The program runs throughout the school year, and the mentors are asked to meet with their mentees a minimum of five times for an hour in that time period. "It is a deeper dive than just a one-day job





shadow and it is not quite as intense as an internship or co-op," said Mrs. Fisher. "The program offers the students the opportunity to explore career fields of interest. The ideal scenario is for the students to meet at the mentor's place of business as this will offer the students the opportunity to experience the work environment first-hand. If scheduling is a problem, they can meet at the Morton Chamber of Commerce or

another public place."

The program offers the students guidance unparalleled in any textbook or college brochure while they are making a very important decision about their career choice. "The students learn tips and tricks from an experienced professional," said Mrs. Fisher. "The outcome that we are hoping for is to be able to streamline that selection process so that the students

are not going to college and grad school and getting into a career path that they dislike. The program provides more exposure at the time when the students are making those important career

decisions."

One student noted his thoughts about the program in a post-survey: "It was really beneficial to be able to shadow the mentor and to see the day-to-day job atmosphere."

"The Morton Mentor Program was beneficial for my daughter as it helped her to learn and to see an aspect of engineering she had not known before," said a parent in the post-survey.

Morton Chamber of

Commerce and the Morton Economic Development Council Executive Director and CEO Leigh Ann Brown shared her thoughts on how the program is beneficial to the local economy: "Through the Economic Development Council, this program is incredibly valuable as we work with businesses."

"Anytime we can expose the businesses and the career path opportunities in our community to the future workforce, it is incredibly valuable to the students, parents, counselors, educators, our community growth, and especially to the businesses," said Brown. "We have had a lot of conversations and partnered with District 709 about creating career pathways and building out those opportunities at all age levels and so this has been another great program to add to that pathway to fulfill that goal."

The Morton High School students see and understand the significance of mentorship. Since the mentorship program launched three years ago, the number of student applicants has increased 600% and is still growing.

to the students. "It is an
honor and privilege to
work with the Morton
Chamber of Commerce
to provide the Morton
Mentoring Program to the
students of MHS. It is an
invaluable experience for
each student to learn from

a local professional's career journey."

"Mentors have an opportunity to companion a very young adult on their career path and provide them support and encouragement as they explore options within their chosen career cluster. Students are fortunate to live in a community that values and fosters professional relations," she said.

Although the increase in the number of students applying is advantageous, the program will begin to need more mentors with the increased interest.

Morton High School is interested in recruiting any professional that is willing to be a mentor. "We do have a lot of students interested in both the health sciences and the science, technology, engineering, and mathematics careers," said Mrs. Kienitz.

There are students who are interested in a career field that the Morton Chamber of Commerce can't match with a mentor. "It would be nice to know what types of professionals that are out in the area and if they are interested in helping the students," said Mrs. Fisher. "Right now, we have students with interests that we don't have a direct fit because we can't find a person who works in that certain profession."

"We would like to hear from the current professionals in the area and encourage them to become a mentor."

One School One Book unites one community

he One School One Book program brought a community closer together through literacy as all elementary school students, teachers, and families read the book "Masterpiece" together.

UNPLUGGED: The Importance of Limiting Screen Time (For Adults and Children)

recent study by mobileinsurance. .com has revealed that the average person spends 90 minutes a day on their phone. Additionally, studies have shown that Americans check their phones an average of 80 times a day while on vacation, with some checking their screen more than 300 times each day. If we spend 90 minutes a day on our phones, that means that up to 23 days a year and 3.9 years of the average person's life is spent staring at their phone screen. Any way you cut it, this is a lot of time staring at a screen.

A growing body of evidence shows that video games and other electronics induce the fight-or-flight syndrome, putting the body in a state of stress. Studies show sustained increases in blood pressure and pulse, even hours after playing a video game or viewing a screen. These games don't have to be a violent game, or even an action game - or even a game at all. Over time, social media surfing and texting will similarly put the brain and body in a state of stress, just from the high level of visual and cognitive stimulation. This can then lead to disruptions in sleep where deep sleep is sacrificed, causing the restorative stages of sleep to be cut short. Over time, this can have negative health impacts for kids and adults and can negatively



impact a student's overall functioning at school.

Looking at how we use screens with our kids is important. Generally speaking, if we use screens as a tool, both parents and children come to rely on screens. For example, many parents rely on screens to help calm their children when they are upset or to get their child to sit still. Such reliance, while effective in the moment, can also limit a child's opportunity to develop age-appropriate attention and self-regulation skills, which are the foundation for learning.

For example, if parents and children get into the habit of putting on a YouTube video anytime the child gets upset, the child is not learning to use their brain or body to help them calm down on their own. Furthermore, with young children, they are not learning to use their social skills with those around them (often

parents) to calm themselves. Similarly, children who come to rely on screens to help them sit at the dinner table, stay in their crib or sit in a waiting room are not getting the opportunity to practice these self-regulatory skills.

With all this in mind, here are some practical strategies you could use to help establish healthy screen time practices that can help with overall exposure to screens and to build age-appropriate self-regulation skills:

► Model Healthy
Electronic Use — Setting
examples of healthy electronics
use for children is vital.
Keeping the TV on for
background noise all the time
or scrolling through Facebook
any time we have a spare
minute teaches bad habits.

► Make Screen Time a

Privilege — Screen time
should be a privilege and not

a right. Take away privileges, such as TV time or computer use, as a negative consequence. Once vou've set a limit on how much screen time is allowed, don't allow kids to earn extra time as a reward. Instead, stick to the daily limit and offer other free or lowcost rewards.

► Set Aside Times to Unplug or Power Down

— Set aside times

for the entire family to become unplugged from electronic devices. You could start with the dinner hour and an hour before bedtime. Consider having a basket or bin where everyone places their electronics during this screenfree time. Not only will this allow for more quality time together as a family, but it will help promote healthier sleep patterns if screens are turned off an hour before bedtime.

▶ Create "Technology-Free Zones" — Establish zones in your house where you just don't allow electronics, like smartphones, tablets, and laptops. For example, the dining room can be a great technology-free zone that is reserved for meals and family conversation.

► Set Up, Use, and Monitor Parental Controls

— Use parental controls on your/their devices that allow

you to monitor what your children are viewing on TV and what they're doing online. In some instances, you can also set parameters on when the devices can be active and when they can connect to the internet.

► Talk to Kids About the Dangers of Too Much Screen Time — Kids who understand, "It's not healthy to watch too much TV," are less likely to try and break the rules compared to kids who think, "I can't watch TV because my parents are mean."

► Encourage Other

Activities — Kids easily grow dependent on technology for entertainment. Encourage your children to become involved in activities that don't involve screens. Get your child to play outside, read a book, or play a game.

► Don't Allow Screen Media in Your Child's

Bedroom — It will be nearly impossible to monitor a child's screen media use if it's allowed in the bedroom. Don't allow your child to have a TV, video game system or computer in his room. This includes handheld devices that many children use late at night, which can interfere with their sleep.

Please keep in mind that the suggestions provided here will need to be adapted to the age of your specific child. If you would like further assistance in working through specific screen time issues, consult your child's teacher or your school building's school psychologist or social worker for further assistance.

Some of the playground pieces have already been purchased through funds already collected. The installation of the previously purchased equipment is expected to take place over the summer. However, additional funds to complete the project are needed. Fundraising will continue throughout 2019 to go towards additional planned pieces of equipment as well as installation costs.

Morton District 709 Facilities Goal

orton District 709 will develop and maintain facilities providing the current and future students with safe, well maintained, and functional space to support research-based best practices in teaching and learning."

The Morton District 709's 15-year plan is focused on the priority of maximizing the use of the current facilities. Over the last six months, the board has identified the renovations needed to help reach the facilities goal.

Morton Junior High Addition Approved

One aspect of the work identified and approved by the Morton 709 Board of Education is an addition at Morton Junior High School. Phase 1 of the project focuses on improving safety, traffic flow, and parking. The plan includes a new drop off/pick up area, new office space with a more secure entryway, additional parking, new elevator, and additional classroom space. This work will begin summer of 2019, with the new office, additional classroom space, and new elevator being completed in the fall of 2019. The new drive, drop off area, and parking will be a joint project with the Village of Morton expected to be completed by August 2020. Phase 2 includes a gymnasium if the funds become available.

MEAC Auditorium Renovation

The MEAC auditorium renovation is also part of the 15 year plan to fully utilize existing facilities. To make this space fully functional, it is necessary to increase handicap accessibility and provide adequate seating for student performances.

 - a. STEM Classrooms b. Update General Classrooms for 21st Century Learning
- 3. The Canopy Entrance Expansion Project.
- a. This project enlarges foyer space, adds a concession stand, restrooms and enlarges girls' varsity locker room.
- b. Remodel PE locker rooms / lockers / new bleachers / resurface gym floor
- 4. Enhance Labor Trade Teaching Space
 - a. Enhance manufacturing space and equipment b. Auto space and equipment

Morton District 709 will continue to monitor enrollment and best practices in facility use to support student learning, and evaluate the resources needed to make improvements.

Morton Moving Forward making progress

District Goal - Achievement:

orton District 709 will nurture and challenge each student to reach his/her greatest potential through evidencebased instructional practices and the highest quality of instruction, curriculum, programs, and services.

Morton District 709 continues to implement various aspects of Morton Moving Forward. We want to share with you the new opportunities for students that will be instrumental in improving student learning. Below is an update on how we are pursuing the District Goal of Achievement:

Strategy 1 - Systemic Focus on Reading

▶ Implement Readers Workshop and Literacy Coaches at each of the elementary schools — Our principals and teachers have shared positive feedback regarding Readers Workshop implementation. Learning new strategies is hard work, and our staff has been up to this challenge. As we continue our work, literacy coaches will continue to support our students as they each become better readers!

► Implement Full Day Kindergarten

- Our kindergarten teachers have reported progress in student academic development and transition skills. This is attributed to the opportunity to improve the pacing of academic and social development issues. Kindergarten teachers have noted that student progress has accelerated due to the increased time and attention teachers are able to devote to each student.

Strategy 2- Intentional Transition to Secondary

► Develop and implement JHS schedule

that increases core instructional time and enhancement opportunities

- The District 709 Board of Education has approved a robust proposal from Morton Jr. High School on how to simultaneously improve transition to the



counselor/student ratio for greater guidance of HS students toward post-secondary options - The MHS Counseling Department has been able to improve its responsiveness to student and parent needs. Several services have been

▶ Reduce

high school and student performance in key academic areas of Math and English/ Language Art. The new schedule is supported by a new leadership framework, reduced student/counselor ratio, and an instructional coach. The schedule was developed collaboratively with teachers and will move our junior-high students to the front of the pack in terms of academic preparation, student support, and transitioning.

▶ Develop plan for departmentalization at the 5th and 6th grades - Conversations around fifth- and sixth-grade departmentalization have been challenging in large part due to our grade level structure. We are moving toward teachers at those grade levels being responsible for either a Math/Science assignment, or a Language Arts/Social Science assignment. We believe this structure will help improve academic rigor and meaningful transition behaviors needed for junior high school and high school students.

Strategy 3- Redefine College and Career Readiness

added as a result, including counselor/ parent coffees, a counseling department newsletter, electronic transcripts, and social/emotional group supports. Student Activities now has a stronger identity and hopefully will increase student participation through extracurricular opportunities. Morton High School and Morton Junior High currently have 77% and 79% student participation. We will be reviewing data regarding student involvement this spring as we seek to have every student involved with an extracurricular activity.

▶ Increase certification programs that align with area workforce shortage needs and Increase opportunities for college credit for all students - Counselors, teachers, and administrators have worked to identify certificate programs with the potential to help students secure employment after graduation in the areas of automotive and manufacturing. Business partnerships are being developed in those areas as well, with Sam Leman and Parker Fabrication offering to help support our programs with equipment and

potentially work opportunities for our students. These programs not only address student needs, but also regional workforce shortage areas. In addition to the certificate programs being developed, new AP and dual credit courses are being proposed as additions to the curriculum for next year. One class being discussed is AP Computer Programming, and another, Human Anatomy and Physiology, is being considered as a new course for the 2020-21 school year. Auto 110 is also being considered for next year and would be dual credit.

Strategy 4 - Organize and Invest in Professional Learning

► Improve opportunities for professional **learning** - Teachers and administrators have been working diligently to provide meaningful professional learning opportunities that have been critical to professional development. Each school has used the time to advance actions in Morton Moving Forward, and as a result there has been considerable progress. In addition, instructional and literacy coaches have been playing a vital role supporting teachers who focus on teaching strategies that provide the greatest impact on their students. We have done outstanding work in embracing these learning opportunities as we look to improve student learning!

Morton History Project gives users a glimpse of the past in a whole new way


he 2018 Morton History Project has been published, and community members are invited to find the Morton History Story Map, oral histories and written narratives on the Morton Chamber of Commerce Website under the "Community" tab.

The Morton History Project was made possible by a Morton Community Foundation grant and implemented in partnership with the Morton Chamber of Commerce and Morton Public Library. The project sought to capture and share Morton's history in a whole new way.

Launched in May of 2018, the Morton Chamber of Commerce set out to collect written narratives and audio/visual recordings of people's memories of the Morton community. These recordings are published on the Morton History webpage and can be enjoyed for years to come. Topics discussed include family heritage, favorite memories and beloved businesses in Morton's history.

Another outcome of the project is a digital story map that displays an address on a map alongside a historical photo of that location with information about a business that existed at that location in years past. It is an interactive map that allows participants to walk from place to place and see what Morton addresses looked like at different points in

A third outcome of the project are oral history resources for use in the future too. We know there are countless stories to tell about Morton's people and places in history and this project only scratches the surface. 
